As is the case with physical health effects, caregiving for someone with dementia is associated with higher levels of distress and depression than caring for someone who doesn ' t have dementia. 17 Recently researchers have focused not only on providing care as a cause of distress, but also on the caregiver ' s perception of how much the patient is suffering.

The typical profile of a dementia caregiver is a middle-aged or older female child or spouse of the person with dementia. 3,8-10 In the US, at least 60% of unpaid caregivers are wives, daughters, daughters-in-law, granddaughters, and other female relatives, 3,11 although male caregivers are
